Trade & Services Dominate Pakistan's Business Landscape; Manufacturing Smaller Than Services, Education & Health Show Social Depth

Islamabad, September 18th, 2025

Gallup Pakistan, as part of its Big Data Analysis initiative, presents the third release in its series on the Economic Census 2023/24, conducted by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). This release highlights the sectoral distribution of Pakistan's 7.14 million economic establishments, showing how trade and services dominate the enterprise landscape, while manufacturing, agriculture, education, and health reveal the structural balance of the economy.

What is the Big Data Analysis Series by Gallup?

Gallup Pakistan's Big Data series was started by Bilal I Gilani, Executive Director of Gallup Pakistan. Bilal explains the rationale of the series: *"The usual complaint from academics and policy makers is that Pakistan does not have data availability. Our experience negates that. Pakistan has lots of data, but it is not available in a usable form and not widely accessible. At Gallup we plan to bridge this gap in terms of accessibility and use of data. The Gallup Big Data series has earlier worked with data sets such as [PSLM](#), [Labour Force Survey](#), and [Economic Survey reports](#) as well as [National Census Reports](#) and [Election Commission Data sets](#). The current series is using the [Global Burden of Disease dataset](#), which provides a variety of health-related statistics. We hope that these series are useful, and we welcome both feedback as well as possible collaborations as we create a public good in the form of useful data sets in Pakistan."*

What data points this current edition covers:

The Economic Census provides, for the first time, a detailed provincial breakdown of all establishments. This distribution is crucial for policymakers and researchers to understand regional economic strengths, disparities, and opportunities.

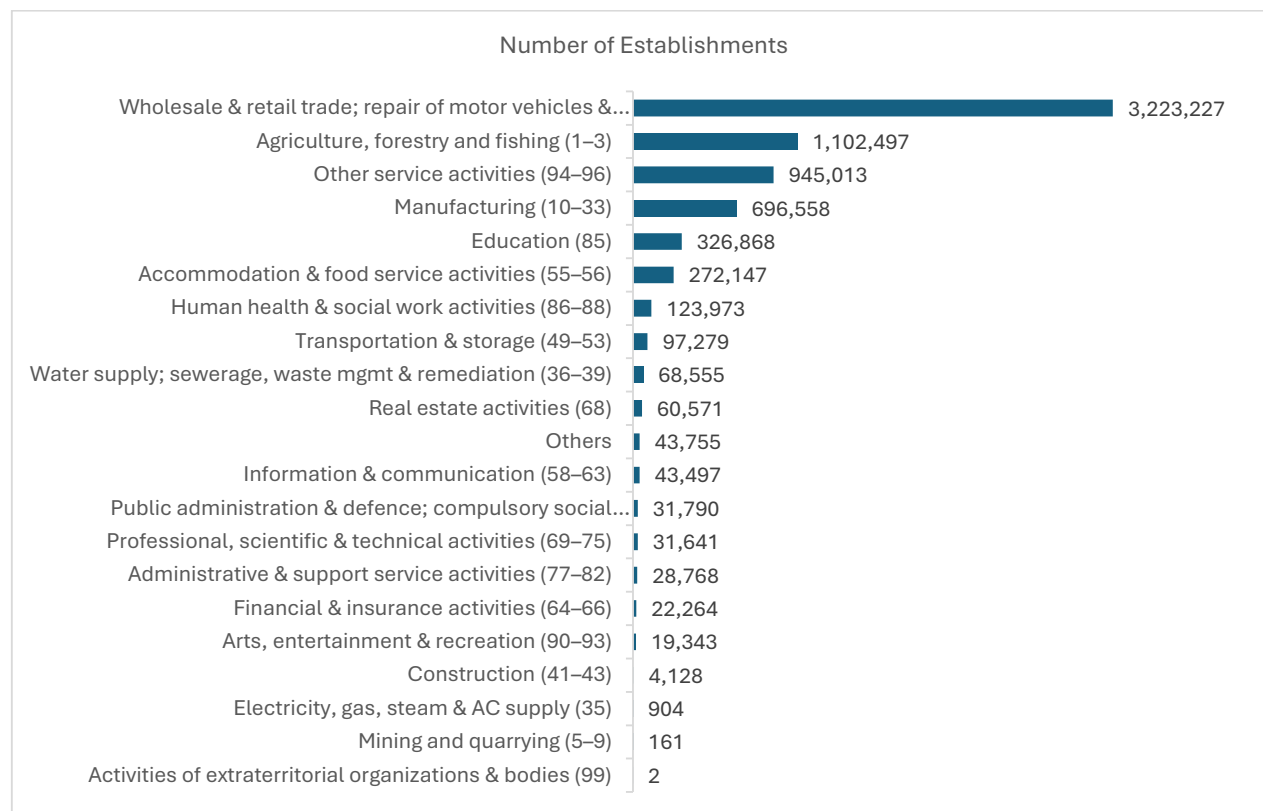

1. Establishments by PSIC Major Section

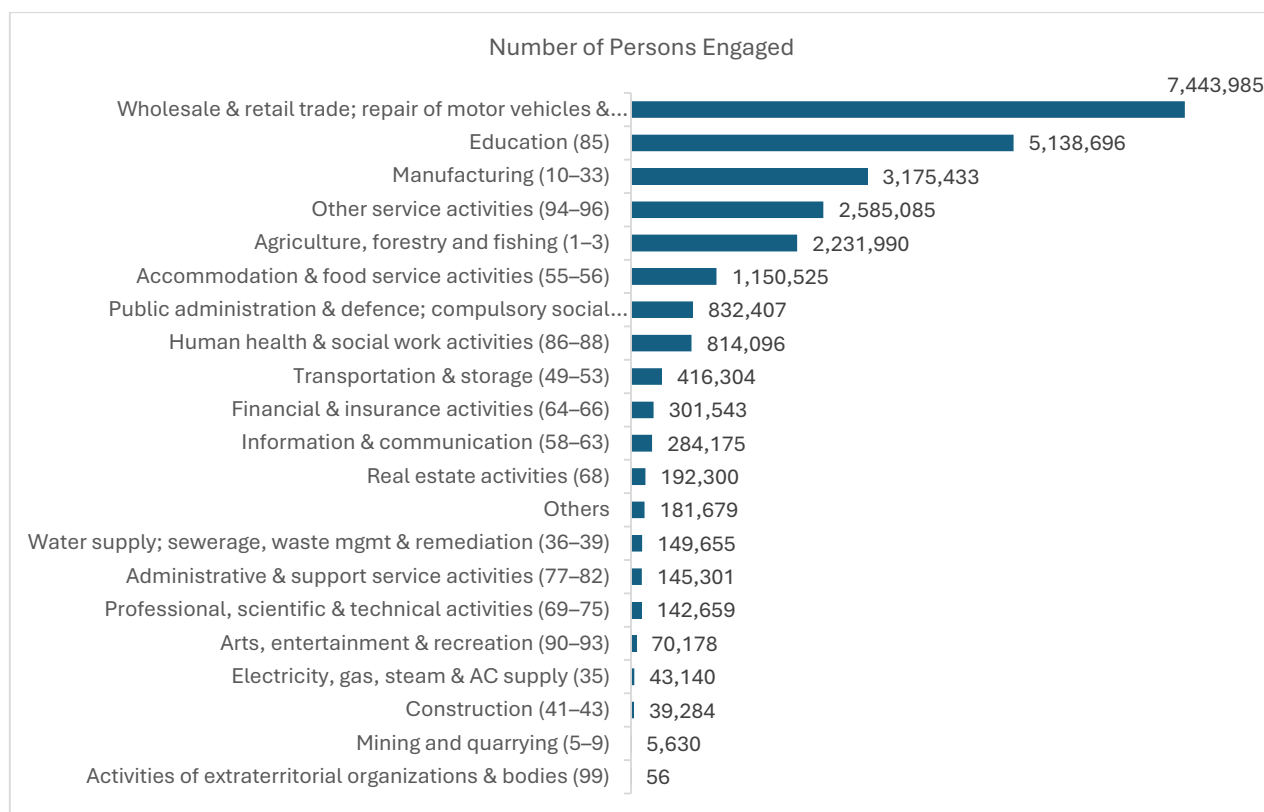
Pakistan's economic map is firmly service- and trade-led. With 3.22 million units, wholesale & retail dwarfs every other category. Manufacturing—while smaller in count (~0.70 million)—is a heavier employer than many service branches, indicating larger average workforce per unit. Agriculture-linked establishments remain a substantial 1.10 million, reflecting the persistence of farm-linked commerce and processing. Other service activities (~0.95 million) highlight the breadth of household-facing services underpinning everyday economic life.

2. Workforce by PSIC Major Section

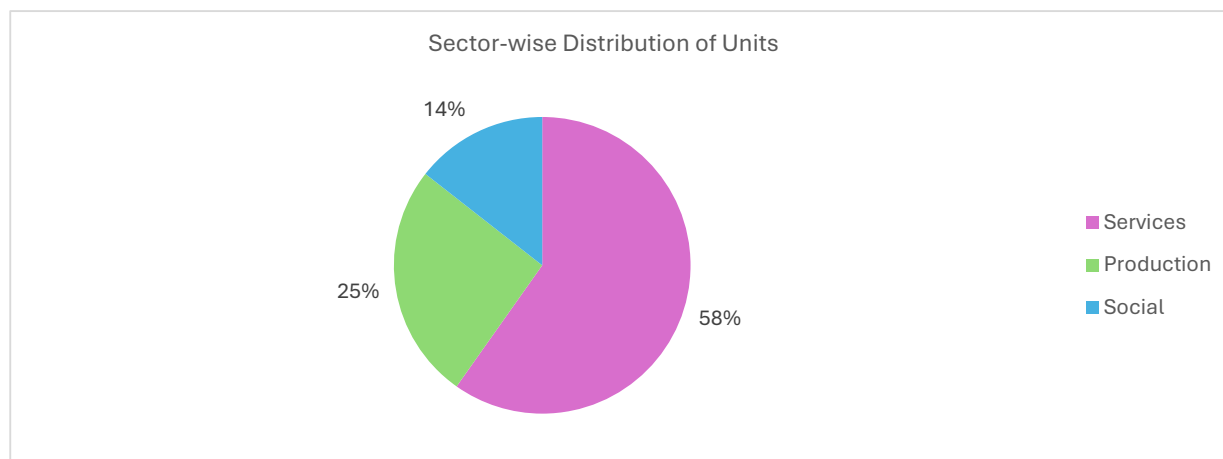
Education stands out with 5.14 million persons engaged, exceeding even wholesale & retail in total persons engaged. Wholesale & retail employs 7.44 million, echoing its commercial reach, while manufacturing engages 3.18 million, showing employment depth despite fewer units. Health & social work (0.81 million) further round out the social infrastructure. Together, these patterns reveal a consumption- and services-led workforce.

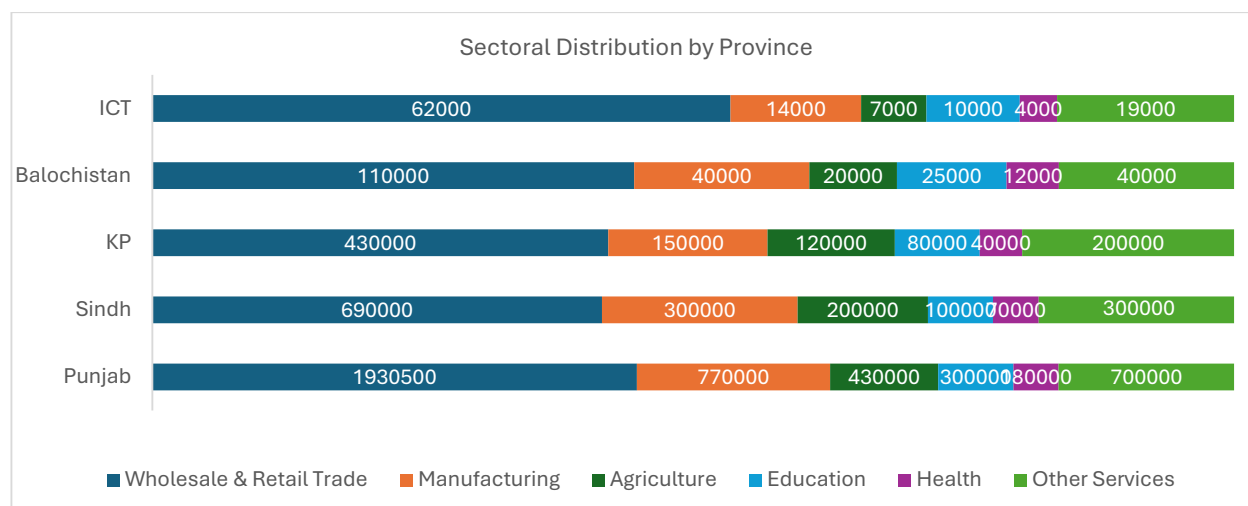
3. Sector-wise Distribution of Units

The services sector's 58% share shows how decisively the economy is organized around trade, hospitality, transport, finance, communications, and a wide array of personal/community services. Production at 25% combines manufacturing and agri-linked activities; it is substantial but clearly second to services in enterprise count. The social sector (14%)—education, health, community welfare—punches above its weight in employment terms, reflecting its systemic importance.

The provincial breakdown of sectoral establishments shows distinct structural patterns across Pakistan. Punjab, with the largest population and industrial base, accounts for the majority of trade (1.93 million units) and manufacturing (770,000 units), reflecting its role as the country's commercial and industrial hub. Sindh follows, with strength in both trade (690,000) and manufacturing (300,000), heavily concentrated in Karachi's urban economy. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) is characterized by a strong presence of household-scale agriculture (120,000 units) and services (200,000 units), while Balochistan shows smaller but regionally vital contributions in agriculture and trade. ICT, though small in population, has a disproportionately higher concentration of education and health establishments, aligning with its urban, service-oriented profile.

4. Policy Considerations

1. Services-first growth: The dominance of services drives diffusion of business ownership but caps productivity and export potential. Formalization and digitization of MSMEs can lift productivity.
2. Manufacturing's employment depth: Despite fewer units, manufacturing's 3.18 million workforce indicates scope to scale via industrial estates, reliable power, and credit for technology adoption.
3. Social sectors as employers: Education (5.14m) and Health (0.81m) show large footprints. Prioritizing quality and skills would amplify human-capital dividends.
4. Agriculture-linked enterprises: With 1.10 million establishments, agro-linked activity remains central. Cold chains, storage, and upstream services can raise margins and reduce waste.

About the Economic Census

The **Economic Census** is Pakistan's most comprehensive and authoritative statistical exercise on business and enterprise activity. Conducted by the **Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS)**, it provides policymakers, researchers, and the public with a detailed snapshot of the structure of economic establishments across the country. The Census records information directly from enterprises and institutions, covering critical aspects such as establishment type, sectoral classification, workforce size, and location.

The 2023/24 Economic Census marks the country's **first integrated enumeration of economic activity**, conducted alongside the 7th Population and Housing Census. By merging these efforts, PBS not only achieved significant cost savings but also created Pakistan's first geo-coded **Business Register** — a foundational dataset for understanding enterprise dynamics nationwide.

This inaugural round represents an important milestone in Pakistan's statistical history. It incorporates methodological innovations such as **digital data collection, GIS-based mapping, and geo-tagging of establishments**, resulting in more reliable and timely results. The Census thus provides insights not only into the size and distribution of enterprises but also into the emerging challenges and opportunities facing Pakistan's economy — from the dominance of small-scale units to regional disparities in business activity and the rise of service-oriented enterprises.

Ultimately, the Economic Census stands as the **foundation for enterprise statistics in Pakistan**. Its findings guide ministries, provincial departments, and regulators in designing SME policies, industrial strategies, and regional development initiatives. They also serve as a valuable reference for academics, investors, and development partners seeking to understand Pakistan's business landscape. By documenting both continuity and change in enterprise structure, sectoral composition, and regional distribution, the Census underscores the vital role of establishments in the country's economic and social development.

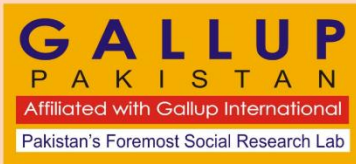
